What suit should I play?



ON SATURDAY 4^{TH} FEBRUARY, you are East playing Board 3. You hold A 7 4 3; T 8; Q; A T 7 6 3 2. South is dealer; the auction is: S Pass; W 1 Φ ; N 1 Φ ; E Pass; S 2 Φ ; (all pass).

The opening lead seems fairly obvious: $\diamond Q$. Leading a singleton in partner's suit when you have four trumps is very attractive. You have visions of partner overtaking, giving you a ruff, back to partner, ruff, rinse, repeat. Yum. Dummy is: $\diamondsuit QJT \heartsuit 7632 \diamondsuit AJ73 \clubsuit 84$

The first trick goes Q-A-6-8! Your dream is shattered. Next declarer calls for the Queen of trumps (Spades). Partner plays low and you win with the Ace. Now what? You need to get the lead to your partner so that you can get a Diamond ruff. Do you lead a Heart or a Club? You have no way of knowing, and you have already made the mistake which prevents you from finding out! The mistake was neglecting to think and count. Let's back up. Before you play the Ace of Spades, do some counting. Declarer overcalled, so they have five, dummy has three, and you have four. Therefore, partner's card is a singleton. If you don't take your Ace then declarer will lead a second trump and your partner will be able to discard, giving you a suit preference. Now it is easy — you duck rather than take your Ace of trumps. Declarer plays a second trump and partner discards **9**.

Playing low to encourage, you receive a clear signal that partner does not want a Heart lead. You take your Ace of trumps and smoothly play a Club. Partner plays the Queen, which wins, and gives you a Diamond ruff. Then you play another Club to partner's King and you receive a second Diamond ruff. Two ruffs, two Clubs and the Ace of trumps holds the contract to eight tricks. Half the field made nine or ten tricks in Spades. Holding the contract to eight gives you a 72% result on the board. The full deal (Dealer South, EW vulnerable):
