Message from the President




Greetings All,

Where were you born?

I was born in Sydney at Crown Street Women's Hospital; I am the eldest of five children (two brothers and two sisters) with only five and a half years separating me from my youngest brother. I spent the first ten years of my life living in the inner Sydney suburb of Rozelle, and then in 1958 my parents built a War Service home in the outer western suburb of Mount Druitt. This was a complete change from Rozelle as it was "the bush" compared to where we had lived, but we soon came to enjoy the freedom of being able to roam the bush and explore new and exciting territory. I attended Colyton Primary School which was just up the road from home so I could walk to school. Then off to St Mary's High School (St Mary's is the next suburb west of Mt Druitt) so it was bus and train travel to attend school. I enjoyed all of my school years and I was also a member of the school Army Cadet Unit and Band.



What is one of your best memories of growing up?

The carefree attitude of being able to just be kids, there was no peer pressure back then and the only requirements our parents put on us was that we had to be home before sunset. My friends and I had a huge tree house in a big old Apple Gum down near the local creek where we spent a lot of our school holidays happily playing and fishing.

Did you or your family play cards when you were young? What games?

I learnt to play Euchre and 500 when I was about ten or eleven and on wet days in the holidays we would play euchre all day. I don't remember any other card games being played at home and I don't remember my parents ever playing regular card games.

What was your occupation and what did that entail?

This is a tricky question because I have had a very varied range of occupations; a friend once commented that I had had "more starts than Phar Lap".

I left school at the age of fifteen with my Intermediate Certificate and was apprenticed as a boilermaker for a small engineering workshop in the Sydney suburb of Enfield. It was a four year apprenticeship and in my last year I had a pretty bad motor cycle accident where I spent five weeks in hospital and after getting out of hospital I decided that I was going to get a job that better suited my interests.

Over my fifty years of working I worked as an automotive parts salesperson, clerk for the PMG's Department, a car salesman, insurance broker, a branch manager for Avco Financial Services, Greater Pacific Finance and St George Building Society, an undertaker, a pub cleaner, an office manager for the Engineering Department of Bega Valley Shire Council, a self-employed windscreen repairer, the Service Department Administrator and the Sales Department Administrator of Tutt Bryant Group Qld (a large company which sells earthmoving equipment) and lastly an adult trainer teaching electronic bookkeeping.

What family do you have and what do they do?

My wife and I will be celebrating our 50th wedding anniversary this year and we will be celebrating with our three children and our seven grandchildren. Our eldest daughter Amanda and her husband Miles are both self-employed and work from home, they have four daughters - the eldest are 22 year old twins, Indya who works with animals and Tayha who is a beautician, then a 14 year old Sikari and a twelve year old Aysha, both still in high school.

Our son Brendan is also self-employed. He is a qualified cabinetmaker and also works as a contract landscaper. He has two boys, the eldest Coan is 24 years old works

in primary school. They all live in the local area so we see them quite regularly.

What led you to take up Bridge? (Expand)

I promised myself when I retired that I would learn how to play Bridge as I like to try to keep the grey matter ticking over. When we first came to this area in 1993 I met Lyn Ebert through my business and she was always at me to "come and learn to play Bridge", but unfortunately for me it took another twenty years before I did. I attended the lessons in August 2017 which were taught by Lyn Graham and since then I have been hooked. I am immensely grateful to Wendy Doyle and Dawn Horder who took me under their wings early on and later to Liz Jeffery.

You do a fantastic job as head dealer at the Club. Please explain what that entails.

It is just a matter of turning up at the club on a regular basis with our crew and determining how many boxes we have to deal, then creating the deal files on the computer and processing the boards. The dealing machines do all of the hard work and you just become a process worker for a few hours. Hilary Lewis and Geoff Brooks are my two main helpers but we have a number of other people who assist from time to time.

What has been the biggest challenge as head dealer?

Learning how to import files from the ABF for State and National Tournaments and just trying to learn all I can about the dealing system.

What do you enjoy most about playing Bridge?

The challenge of trying my best every time I play, as well as the camaraderie and friendships I have made since joining the club.

What other interests do you have?

Motor racing and cooking are my other two passions, although I am probably not as keen on motor racing as I once was. I also played cricket and golf, and umpired cricket for a number of years at a higher level than I could ever play. I also had the privilege of being Team Manager of the NSW Country Cricket Team at the Australian Country Championships for seasons 1991/1992 and 1992/1993.

What is the one thing you would like to see change in the world and why?

I would like to see more of a 'We' society again instead of this 'Me' society that seems to have taken over, where no one wants to take responsibility for their own actions and are always looking for someone else to blame. Natural disasters like floods and bushfires always seem to bring out the goodness in people but I feel we need to look out for each other all of the time.

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Don't do that!

There are very few absolute rules for declarers or defenders. My favourite absolute rule is "Lead an Ace against 7NTx". There are some things that are very, very bad but maybe not an absolute. It happens surprisingly frequently that the action you take is to choose the "least worst" option.

Most players learn early on that underleading an Ace is a bad idea. Leading a singleton trump is another bad idea. Second player playing a high card is not a good idea. A bad idea that is less frequently mentioned is the idea of giving a "ruff and discard". So, what is that?



Here is a really simple example. Spades are trumps and you are the declarer sitting South.

There are only two tricks to go

and you have a trump trick and a loser in Diamonds. If you are on lead there is nothing you can do to prevent losing a trick. But ... what if West is on lead?


There are only two tricks to go and West has an Ace. Many people can't wait to get that Ace on the table. After all if it doesn't make a trick now it is never going to make a trick, right?

But look what happens if West

leads the ♥A. Dummy will ruff with the A and declarer will discard the \blacklozenge 2. For the last trick, dummy leads the \blacklozenge 4 and Declarer ruffs with the **A**K. Two tricks for declarer and no tricks for the defence. West has just given a "ruff and discard". On the lead of the ♥A one hand ruffs and the other discards.

If West leads the \blacklozenge 3 instead then dummy has to follow suit. East wins with the **♦**5 and Declarer follows suit. Declarer loses the trick.

That was an artificial example to make the point. Unfortunately, the real world is more complicated than that. Here is a recent hand from the club.



The 2NT overcall is the so-called "unusual No Trump" which describes a hand which has five cards in each of the minors but less than opening strength. East





nine card fit is going to make a good sacrifice.

South makes the opening lead of A (don't underlead an Ace). North encourages with the **\$**5 and so South continues with another Spade. The second trick is won by North with the $\bigstar K$. North is concerned about leading the suits headed by an Ace and also knows that leading a singleton trump is bad. Accordingly, they lead a third round of Spades (perhaps they thought "return your partner's suit").

The third round of Spades turns out to be a ruff and discard. East ruffs and West discards their singleton Heart. One loser has just disappeared for declarer.

The remainder of the play is a matter of taking one top trump and then ruffing two Diamonds in the East hand to ensure the contract only goes down two tricks. North/ South score 300 but they have an easy game in Spades and so receive few matchpoints.

Looking at all four hands it is easy to see that the defence should take two Spade tricks, one Heart, one Diamond and one trump for three off and a score of 500. The problem is with North leading the third round of Spades. From their point of view partner may have started with only five Spades and so declarer would have had another one. What they didn't consider is

that a ruff and discard is such a bad play that you should not even risk it happening.



The ♥A is a much better option (top of touching honours).

It is almost always wrong to give declarer a "ruff and discard". A ruff and discard will give declarer a trick they are not entitled to. Don't do it! On the list of bad things to do it is right towards the top.

A ruff and discard is so good for declarer that good declarers are always on the lookout for situations where they can *force* the defence to give them one. But that is an advanced topic for another day.

Is your email address in your Profile in the Booking System?

Please check that your email address is in your 'Profile' in the Booking System. This means you receive an email confirming your booking and then a reminder on the day prior. And we can send an email to just the players booked for the session with any updates about the session e.g. recently a couple of cancellations with those floods.

Enquiring about an alerted bid

If your opponents have used an artificial bid which has been alerted as required, then you are allowed to know the meaning of that bid. BUT there are laws and guidelines that govern if, when and how you seek an explanation. There is also a distinction between asking during the auction and after the auction.

You should never ask about an alerted bid in the following situations:

- 1. it is not your turn to call during the auction
- 2. it is not your turn to lead or play to a trick after the auction
- 3. you are only asking for the benefit of your partner
- 4. you are only curious about the systems that other people play
- 5. during the auction you are likely to pass regardless of any explanation
- 6. during the play and you are dummy

Any transgression here could be seen as conveying unauthorised information to your partner and allow the opponents to make a claim that they have been disadvantaged by the transgression and seek an adjusted score. This is a tricky area for directors and certainly not something that your volunteer playing directors wish to do.

An example: Using Bergen Raises EW had an uncontested auction to 4H with the artificial bid of 2S being alerted but neither opponent enquiring as to its meaning (exactly three hearts and 10-12 total points).





Just before making his second bid South could have asked for an explanation of the 2S bid but correctly didn't. His uninspiring hand would have been a pass regardless. Point 5 above.

Before making his final Pass, North could have asked about the 2S bid but didn't partly due to knowing the Bergen system or at least inferring it from the bidding

but also because he would pass regardless of the explanation. North is on lead so is again entitled to ask but didn't because no answer would persuade him to lead anything else than the top of his diamond sequence.

NS have been exemplary so far but after the auction and before the first lead, South transgressed because he now asked about the 2S bid. The answer above was stated. A further question followed asking whether the 2S bid implied anything about the spade holding. Now both of these questions are against the rules as South is not on lead. South's questions may have implied a spade holding and this would be unauthorized information to North. If North led a spade then declarer had the right to call the director at the end of play of the hand if he thought this disadvantaged the contract. South was only curious about the systemic bid but should have asked after the play of all boards in the round was complete and only if time allowed.

After the auction and if it is your turn to lead or play, the advice is to not ask about a specific bid but ask for a full review of the auction. This removes all chance of conveying unauthorised information. Again this should only be done if the explanations are likely to affect your choice of card to play or lead.

The rules and guidelines are there to prevent unauthorised information and to help with the flow of the game. Please follow them.


